Dear Colleagues,

Welcome to APA 2026! The convention theme is “Lead through...Advocacy, Research, Action, and Purpose!” The theme for the Society of Clinical Psychology (SCP) Division 12 Program is “Broadening Our Perspectives on What Makes Good Psychological Science.” Your 2026 SCP Convention Team, led by Lauren Ehrlich, PhD and Melanie Morse, PhD, Program Co-Chairs, with support from Tara Craighead, has created a dynamic program from a large collection of high-quality submissions. Many thanks to all who submitted or reviewed abstracts this year!

I encourage you to attend APA and take advantage of the many learning, networking, and research collaboration opportunities. There are a plethora of potential sources of inspiration found at the convention. Whether you choose to open up your professional world by embracing the whole dynamic convention experience or just select events that correspond to niche interests and hang with close, like-minded colleagues, the APA convention is like no other. The variety of programming and the opportunities to network and meet colleagues from across the country are unparalleled. There are numerous open division-hosted social hours to support this purpose.

This year we sought to include clinical psychology research that embraced a wide range of populations. The goal was to help us better understand how intersections of identity, diaspora, cultural, and other contexts shape understandings and outcomes in psychological science and practice. An example is the invited address, “Beyond the Lab—Proposing a Decolonial Psychologies Research Paradigm.” My own address will consider the need to take a more global, transnational approach to clinical psychology with the help of AI. Other sessions with an AI focus include, “AI and Assessment Instruction: Competency, Contradiction and Bias” and “Is AI Culturally Competent? Bias, Context and Equity in the Digital Age.”

There are many more incredible presentations, symposia, critical conversations, and skill building workshops. Many of the sessions offer CE credit! They represent the broad scope of clinical psychology, from sessions related to psychotherapy, such as “Age-Affirming Psychotherapy with Older Adults: Doing What Works” and “Becoming Anti-Ageist: Role of psychology & psychologists in age inclusivity” to programs on assessment, such as “Using a Strengths Based Approach to Reduce Bias in Diagnosis and Assessment.” Others showcase new perspectives as in “Hospital/University Based Weight Stigma & Socioemotional Learning Research” and emerging approaches like “Psychedelics In Practice: Lessons from APA CODAPAR Initiative,” “The New Frontier: Shorter Stays, Sicker Patients, and Smarter (Tech) Care,” and “Lessons from “real world” implementations and adaptations of Measurement-based Care (MBC).” There are also sessions on mentoring and training the next generation of clinical psychologists, such as “Standing Out in the Internship Application Process,” “Committing to Evidence-based Clinical Training for Serious Mental Illness,” and “Relational Strategies for Navigating Challenges in Academic Medicine.”

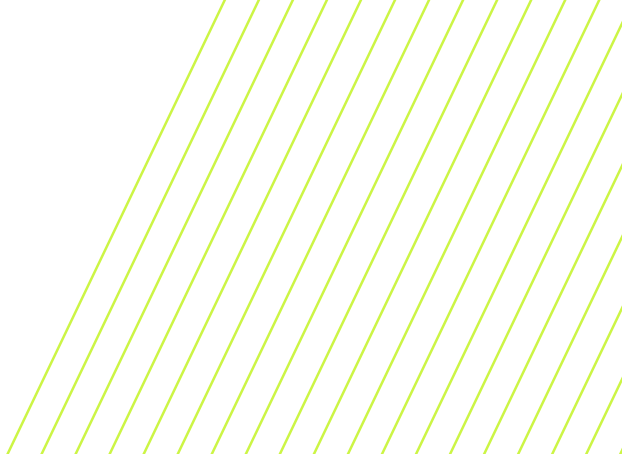

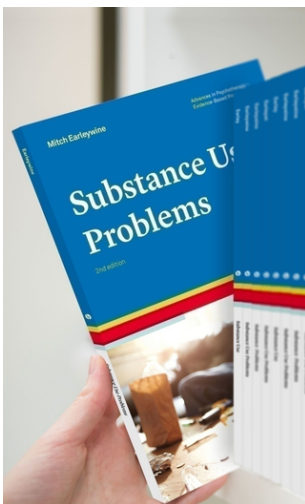

The series Advances in Psychotherapy - Evidence-Based Practice provides therapists with practical evidence-based guidance on the diagnosis and treatment of the most common disorders seen in clinical practice - and does so in a uniquely reader-friendly manner. One strand is dealing with specific disorders, another with methods and approaches. Each book is both a compact how-to reference for use by professional clinicians in their daily work, as well as an ideal educational resource for students and for practice-oriented continuing education. The most important feature of the books is that they are practical and reader-friendly. All have a similar structure, and each is a compact and easy-to-follow guide covering all aspects of practice that are relevant in real life.

Tables, boxed clinical pearls, and marginal notes assist orientation, while checklists for copying and summary boxes provide tools for use in daily practice.

Member Categories

FULL MEMBERS have a demonstrated interest and active engagement in practice, research, teaching, administration, and/or study in the field of Clinical Psychology with training appropriate to the conduct of such clinical activities. They must also be full members of APA. Full members may vote on any Division 12 nominations ballot. Membership also includes subscription to the journal, Clinical Psychology: Science and Practice.

EARLY CAREER PSYCHOLOGIST (ECP) MEMBERS are early-career psychologists in the first four years after postdoctoral study who will learn more about activities and issues of interest to clinical psychologists, including reviewing for journals, mentoring, and much more. Membership includes online subscriptions to the Division 12 journal and newsletter. ECP members may attend the Society's meetings and participate in APA Convention events geared to early-career psychologists. They may also join the Division 12 Listserv, exclusively for Society members.

AFFILIATE MEMBERS are those who may or may not be members of APA and may not have received a clinical degree but who have demonstrated interest in and active engagement in practice, research, teaching, administration, and/or study in the field of clinical psychology. Affiliate members have no vote on Division 12 nomination ballots. Affiliate Membership is \$63 per year.

STUDENT MEMBERS are undergraduate, graduate, and postdoctoral students who will learn more about activities and issues of interest to clinical psychologists. Membership benefits include: affirming your future identity as a clinical psychologist, advocacy for the integration of science and practice, opportunities for networking and involvement in a professional society, as well as the mentorship and student awards programs, and electronic access to the journal Clinical Psychology: Science and Practice. Student members may attend the Society's meetings, without vote, and participate in APA Convention events geared to clinical psychology graduate students. They may join the Division 12 Listserv geared to clinical psychology graduate students. They may also join the Division 12 Listserv exclusively for Society members.

PLEASE NOTE: APA Early Career Psychologist (ECP) and student memberships are separate from the Society's. While APA membership is recommended, the Society does not require student or ECP members to be APA members. For APA membership information, contact the APA Office in Washington, D.C. at (800) 374-2721.
